MICHAEL HUBER: REMEMBERING A GREAT CONSERVATIONIST AND FOUNDING FATHER OF PPA

PPA has lost one of its most ardent supporters. Mike Huber, PPA's first board chair, passed away on January 5th, 2009. Mike's lifelong commitment to conservation and the natural world were seen throughout the state in his work with the New Jersey Conservation Foundation (NJCF), American Littoral Society, and The Nature Conservancy, to name a few. But he will always hold a treasured place in the collective hearts and minds of those of us who care deeply about the Pinelands and PPA.

I initially met Mike in 1989. I was the Sierra Club's representative to the planning committee charged with forming a new Pinelands advocacy group. NJCF and Dave Moore led the effort to assemble a board that would get this fledgling group off the ground. But as the roster was being completed, no one had emerged as a likely chair. Dave Moore must have known all along he had the perfect person. He recommended Mike Huber, a long time North Jersey conservationist and businessman. I had only lived in New Jersey for 2 years at that time, and knew nothing about him. But when I heard that Mike was the CEO

of one of America's largest family-owned businesses, with interests in lumber, chemicals and mining, my Sierra Club hackles were ready to be raised. How could a person with such a background lead the board of what I hoped would be an outspoken advocate for our beleaguered and embattled Pine Barrens? I was a lot more black and white in those days—the naiveté of youth—but I couldn't figure out how this captain of industry could possibly be good for PPA.

Mike began to challenge my stereotypes as soon as he walked into our first meeting. No power suit or glossy leather briefcase, just his trademark well worn khakis, frayed sweater and a scuffed canvas bag. It did not take long for me to realize as the early weeks and months rushed

by, and I got to know this gentle and humble man, how incredibly fortunate we were to have him. I watched him spend much more time listening than talking, I heard his vision for PPA gradually emerge, I marveled at his ability to synthesize complicated issues and I admired his ability to gracefully disagree without anger or spite. His vast organizational experience coupled with his passion for the outdoors made me realize we had won the lottery with Mike. It's hard to imagine a better leader in those years, or anyone who had more of an impact on PPA. He gave so freely of his time and wisdom, and helped give us an early credibility that we barely deserved. And how could you not love a man who, when lunchtime arrived, would pull out a brown bag that looked as old as I was.

He was our leader for 12 years, and he did it all. PPA grew and prospered, as he led us through the highs and lows of developing and maintaining our staff, finding our first home, the many thorny conflicts inherent in good advocacy, and countless meetings and discussions to chart our course. He also remained one of our most active and dedicated board members after stepping down as chair. Only 3 weeks before he died, he called in to participate in a board meeting.

I will always remember his wry smiles, his good humor, his arching

eyebrows, his ever present graciousness. All of us at PPA were so lucky to have worked with him. PPA is immeasurably stronger for his presence, but we will also not be the same without him. Thank you, Mike.

3RD ANNUAL STATE OF THE PINELANDS REPORT

The report details how the specific actions of government agencies and appointed & elected officials either **helped or harmed the Pinelands during the previous year**, including the Pinelands Commission, NJ DEP, NJ State Legislature, Governor, mayors, township councils, federal representatives and actions by the courts. The report is released each year during the last week in June to coincide with the anniversary of the signing of the Pinelands Protection Act on June 28, 1979.

PPA has grown in its expertise and capacity to accomplish its mission: our staff have accumulated years of experience in analyzing development applications and regulatory proposals and added new skill sets like botanical expertise,

education programming and Geographic Information Systems.

PPA staff and volunteers have reached out to many thousands of people over the last 20 years through our Pinelands Adventures, teacher training programs, open houses, fairs and festivals, and speaking engagements across the region.

Most importantly, PPA will take this year to look to the future, with new policy and protection initiatives, new outreach programs, a new look in print and on the Web, and new friends and supporters.

Consider Pinelands plates when your car registration comes due!

Since December 1996, when the legislation establishing a Pinelands license plate was signed into law by Governor Whitman, more than 7,500 sets have been purchased by New Jersey drivers. The six-color plate was designed by Robin Jess of Edison, NJ and depicts blueberries, cranberries, a pine branch with a pine cone and a small green Pine Barrens Treefrog.

The Pinelands plates initially cost \$50 to acquire, with a \$10 annual renewal fee. More than 80% of the initial fee from the sales goes into the "Pinelands Preservation Fund" to be used for land preservation in the Pinelands. The legislation allows the lands that are purchased to include: Green Acres acquisitions; the purchases of land with Limited Practical Use in the Pinelands National Reserve; and for use as a match to federal funds for acquisition of lands with limited practical use.

Green Acres has used the funds in the Limited Practical Use Program to purchase approximately 5,089 acres of land from over 600 land owners throughout the Pinelands National Reserve.

The Limited Practical Use program is a joint Federal, State and Pinelands Commission program aimed at purchasing properties in the Pinelands with limited development potential. To help these landowners and to preserve land, beginning in the early 1990's Congress appropriated funds for acqui-

sition of limited practical use property in the Pinelands, but the federal money must be matched with state funds before the federal money can be released to purchase land.



Deep Run property, Buena Vista

Since 2005 the fees from the sale of Pinelands license plates have been used by Green Acres to purchase limited practical use properties. An example of these properties is pictured above. It is a lot of 4.5 acres located along the Deep Run in Buena Vista Township, Atlantic County. This portion of the Deep Run is located within the federal Great Egg Harbor Wild and Science River boundary and after purchase was assigned to the New Jersey Natural Lands Trust to manage.

In February 2000, Pinelands Preservation Alliance (PPA) launched the bi-monthly publication, the *Pinelands Watch*. The publication is intended to encourage individuals who are concerned about conservation issues in the Pinelands to get involved early in the process and make a difference. Each issue provides a summary of a serious current issue in the Pinelands, provides references for getting more information, and suggests options for taking action.

The *Pinelands Watch* is an early warning system about development issues, changes to the Pinelands Comprehensive Management Plan (CMP), state legislation, water allocation permits, and threats to threatened and endangered species that an individual, citizen group, municipality or organization can use to respond to the threats in the Pinelands. The *Watch* is also an education resource on topics like lawn care practices, sustainable community design, reporting on threatened and endangered species sightings, free workshops, and more.

PPA relies on citizens to regularly monitor their neighborhoods and sound an alarm whenever they see inappropriate applications for development in the Pinelands or other problems that we can work together to solve. Our best oppor-

tunities to stop or modify plans that threaten the integrity of the Pinelands are to get involved in the process as early as possible. Residents should attend township committee and planning board meetings and press for details, ask pointed questions, get copies of documents, and report back to PPA for additional help as well as send the word out to other *Pinelands Watch* members.

We envision a constantly growing network of citizens. Please consider joining our free network to receive the bi-monthly action alert.
